The tradition of the Catholic Church offers many practices to strengthen faith, morality and piety among the people of God. The well established Catholic devotional practice

is a pilgrimage. It is a special religious journey, to honor God in the sacred places of a long Christian history. Over centuries thousands of pilgrims navigated the roads leading to great pilgrimage sites of Christianity including The Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem, the Tomb of St. Peter in Rome, and Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

As Holy Father Benedict XVI is planning his apostolic pilgrimage to the U.S.A. we all may take time to reflect on our own role as pilgrims. We can view the spiritual life as a pilgrimage. The pilgrimage symbolizes the pilgrim's inner journey. The author Jim Forest wrote in his book "The Road to Emmaus, Pilgrimage as a Way of Life", that the pilgrimage is a conscious act of seeking a more vital awareness of God's living presence. We all struggle to find God's presence in our daily life. One way to experience God is to become a pilgrim. Before some of us will go to meet the Pope in the nations capital in April, I would like to suggest you make your own pilgrimage first to one or more sacred places in Washington, DC as a way of a spiritual renewal.

I invite you to consider three holy sites. Each one of these sites has a special role in life of faith within the Archdiocese of Washington. They also have a special significance in gathering Catholics from around the country. If you have been there, consider going again for the sake of your faith. If you have not been there, do not tell anyone but go quickly and make your pilgrimage the best ever.

Hopefully, our council will again be awarded Star Council. This meeting is the culmination of the fraternal year, which ends for your current officers 30 June 2008. This means that it is time again for some of the current officers to consider moving into another role as an officer and more importantly for the re-

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holy time for yourself or your family. Strengthen your good resolve with an ardent prayer. Make a compelling intention you want to take with you on the pilgrimage. May the effort you put in your pilgrimage conquer any obstacles. You will receive back more than your give!

- 1. The historic St. Matthews Cathedral as the mother church of all churches in the Archdiocese is a main house of God, reserved in a special way for the liturgy presided by the archbishop and his auxiliaries. The patron of the place, St. Matthew, evangelist is not only a great personal patron of so many men carrying his name but also a patron of all those who choose the gospel as the rule of life. In recent years the cathedral has undergone thorough renovations and is open to all who go there to express their unity with the bishops and all Catholics of our archdiocese. This year of the papal visit to the USA and the presidential elections is a special time to consider this great destination. The pilgrimage undertaken for the sake of strengthening the Word of God and the unity among Christians in this country seems to be the most appropriate choice.
- 2. The Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land is located at Quincy St. in the heart of the historic Brooklyn district. The seasons of Lent and Easter make this church the preferred pilgrimage destination. It is a small replica of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The interior of the church invites its pilgrims to pray through the inspiration coming from the passion and resurrection of the Lord. A faithful copy of the aedicule, a place of Christ burial makes a powerful impression, especially if venerated in silence and one on one with the religious mystery it recalls. Walking into a burial chamber in faith gives you a better understand of what it means to be buried and raised with Christ

The visit to the catacombs takes pilgrims into the early Christian times and inspires them to appreciate the historical aspects of our faith. This is a great destination for the quiet individual pilgrimages or with a small group. God's presence is overwhelming in this holy site.

3. The Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception is the greatest Marin Shrine of the United States with a 329 ft. tall Knights of Columbus Tower. Located on the grounds of the Catholic University of America, this is the America's Patronal Church. With the upper and lower levels surrounded with numerous chapels, the shrine provides a unique space for experiencing God's presence through the liturgy or a personal prayer. Distinctive architecture, music, art and above all thousands of pilgrims make this place a sacred dwelling of God honored through the Blessed Virgin Mary. This is the blessed destination for any pilgrimage, individual or with one's family. The Holy Father, Benedict XVI will visit this place during his upcoming visit. Why not go there before him to pray for his intentions and the intention of his papal pilgrimage to the USA. Father Jerry



The Knights of Columbus Refund Support Vocations Program

Through this program, councils "adopt" one or more seminarians or postulants and provide them with financial assistance (\$500.00 a year) and moral support. The money is used by them for tuition and books, car insurance and maintenance, travel during vacations, emergency expenditures and other living expenses. Knights provide more than financial support, though. Members write letter to students, sponsor dinners for them, invite them to join the Order and, most importantly, pray for vocations.



Scott Holmer— First Pre-Theology, Theological College. Home parish St. Jerome, Hyattsville. Taught and worked in Campus Ministry at DeMatha Catholic High School and enjoys water and snow skiing. Graduated from Georgetown University.

My decision to enter the seminary was a result of association with holy friends, wanting to be like priests I admire, meditation and prayer. I grew up in a good Catholic family and had a joyful childhood. I was a practicing Catholic but my heart was really not in my faith until I got to college. After high school, I went to Georgetown University and had my first experience with Catholic education. For the first time, I was in an environment where we were learning about God in the classroom.

One of my Jesuit theology professors had a profound impact on me. Because of my admiration of him in the classroom, I decided to attend the Mass he presided over every weeknight at 11:15 PM. His love for the Eucharist was contagious. As I attended daily Mass, took theology classes and participated in the Knights of Columbus, my love and understanding of God grew deeper and deeper. This priest I admired so much asked whether I wanted to become a priest myself. I thought about it briefly but was dating a wonderful girl at the time and was not willing to consider a call to the priesthood. However, I still had a deep love for God and decided to become a religious teacher.

For the next five years after college, I taught English and Religion at DeMatha Catholic High School in Hyattsville, MD and was happy. However, my life changed when my friend and fellow teacher told me that he was in the process of discerning priesthood. He invited me to participate in his bible study group and his rosary prayer group. By developing a constant habit of prayer, I was becoming more open to hearing God's call to enter seminary.

One night, over dinner, a young priest challenged me to consider the priesthood for myself. At first, I was defiant. I had a job I really liked and was happy where I was. However, I could not get out of my head his simple question: "Why not become a priest?" To my surprise, as I imagined myself be-

coming a priest, I actually became enthusiastic about the idea. With the help of a wonderful spiritual director and counsel from my vocations director, I came to the conclusion that I needed to apply to seminary. After a lengthy application process, I was sponsored as a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Washington and sent to the Theological College Seminary in Washington, DC to study philosophy for two years. After fulfilling my philosophy requirement, I will study theology for four years. However, intellectual formation is only one part of becoming a good priest. For my pastoral formation this semester, I am working three hours a week at a place called Living Wages in southeast DC near St. Thomas More parish. At their location, I tutor adult students in GED preparation and computer skills so that they may compete successfully in the job market and become competent parents and family members. I get a tremendous amount of satisfaction of being able to serve God in this way.

In addition to my intellectual and pastoral formation, I meet with a spiritual director once every two weeks to develop a deep and sustaining prayer life to meet the future challenges of priestly ministry as well as to discern if I am indeed being called to the priesthood. As a seminary, we celebrate the Eucharist daily, pray the Liturgy of the Hours in common, and have Eucharistic Adoration. We also have evenings and meals in silence on occasion to better hear God's voice.

However, life is not only about studying and prayer in the seminary. For instance, last weekend we just had our "Iron Seminarian" tournament where we compete against each other in ping-pong, pool and darts. Some of my most memorable experiences in seminary have just been enjoying the company of my fellow seminarians. After attending seminary, I have become immensely proud to be Catholic. I am also humbled by the support I have received from so many Catholics around the Archdiocese of Washington. No vocation to the priesthood happens in a void and I am tremendously appreciative of your support and prayers.



The Dogwood

According to legend at the time of Jesus the dogwood was a large strong tree like the oak or the cedar. Because it was a strong large tree its wood was used to make the cross on which Jesus died.
